


WHAT IS CIRCUIT OF THE AMERICAS AND AUSTIN360 AMPHITHEATER?

Circuit of The Americas is the first purpose-built Grand Prix racing facility in the United States. It was designed and built for entertainment, business and all forms of racing. The Circuit is home to the FORMULA 1 UNITED STATES GRAND PRIXTM, MotoGPTM, Lone Star Le MansTM, and ESPN's X Games. Circuit of The Americas features top-of-the-line garage and pit spaces and a variety of permanent structures designed for meetings, seminars, hospitality, and entertainment.

Its centerpiece is a 3.4-mile racetrack that has quickly become a favorite among the drivers and teams who visit the Circuit every year. The most striking element of the track is Turn One, which features a 133-foot climb into a blind left turn. Some of the Circuit's 19 other turns are inspired by classic racing circuits around the globe. Every aspect of the track is state of the art, from team and spectator facilities to safety structures and the track surface itself.

At the heart of the Circuit, you'll find the Circuit's signature 251-foot observation tower and the beautiful open-air Austin360 Amphitheater, PollStar's 2013 "Best New Major Concert Venue" and a 2014 "Best Major Outdoor Concert Venue" nominee. Circuit of The Americas has partnered with Live Nation to schedule and produce shows starring major, nationally touring artists.



Austin360 Amphitheater, winner of Pollstar's "Best New Major Concert Venue" award for 2013, is Austin's premier destination to see the brightest stars in a world-class, open-air amphitheater. The venue, which is situated within Circuit of The Americas' 1,500-acre sports and entertainment complex, has room for up to 14,000 guests, offers reserved seating for 6,700, and features a spacious lawn perfect for enjoying unforgettable performances under the stars with family and friends. The amphitheater also boasts the largest permanent stage in Central Texas and has hosted some of the biggest names in the entertainment industry, including: Jimmy Buffett, Dave Matthews Band, KISS, Nine Inch Nails, Kanye West, Kenny Chesney, Zac Brown Band, Mumford & Sons, Maroon 5, Blake Shelton, Miranda Lambert, Pitbull, Train, One Republic, Drake, and Lil' Wayne.

Austin, Texas, is revered by artists and their fans as the "Live Music Capital of the World," and Austin360 Amphitheater is building on that fine tradition by bringing incredible entertainment events to the Central Texas region. In addition to intimate concerts, the amphitheater and the Grand Plaza grounds that surround it are designed to host multi-day music festivals, comedians, speakers, private rentals and sporting events.



Best of 2017: Top 25 Golf Courses in Texas



Texas is a state with a rich golf history, and its capital city of Austin is no exception. Located in the heart of the Texas Triangle and on the cusp of the Texas Hill Country, golfers of all walks of life (and wallet size) will find a suitable course. Legendary instructor Harvey Penick, author of the "Little Red Book," helped shape the city's game in the early 20th century, and his reputation grew nationally thanks in part to two of his major-winning pupils, Ben Crenshaw and Tom Kite. West of Austin, there are prestigious private clubs such as Penick's Austin Country Club, University of Texas Golf Club and the Crenshaw-designed Austin Golf Club, but visiting golfers should start at Omni Barton Creek, a sprawling private club that doubles as a luxury golf resort, home to two Tom Fazio designs, plus a Crenshaw and Arnold Palmer course, too. Just east of town, Wolfdancer Golf Club at Hyatt Lost Pines shows off 300-plus acres of prime, central Texas countryside along the Lower Colorado River. And while the PGA Tour passes up Austin for its larger neighboring cities, the Champions Tour got its start back in the 1970s at venerable Onion Creek Country Club, founded by

three-time Masters Champion Jimmy Demaret. While Austin may be better known nationally as a music mecca thanks to Austin City Limits and SXSW, take note that country legend Willie Nelson owns his own casual nine-holer west of the city, the Pedernales Golf Club Cut-n-Putt.

Top 10 Things To Do In Austin, Texas With Kids Posted by: EMILY D

Looking for kid-friendly things to do around town? We've got you covered. Check out our top 10 things to in Austin, Texas with kids! Whether you're a native, a newbie, or a tourist, Austin is jam-packed with activities your whole family can enjoy together. Indoors, outdoors, artsy, educational, or just plain weird, we've got you covered. Here's our go-to list of the ten most Austin-tastic things to see and do with kids in our city.

Bats! Austin proudly hosts the largest urban bat colony in North America. Approximately 1.5 million Mexican free-tailed bats call the Congress Avenue Bridge their summer home. Hundreds of people gather nightly to see and hear the bats' emergence into the sky, where they will gobble literal tons of insects before returning to the roost. Viewing times vary depending on weather and other factors, so we suggest you check BCI's website before heading out.

Street Art and Murals: You've almost certainly seen photos of Austin's most famous murals—"Greetings from Austin" and "i love you so much" to name a couple—and those are practically obligatory souvenir photo ops. But don't stop there! One of many beautiful things about Austin is that art can be found nearly everywhere you look. Our city is blanketed in street art of both the commissioned and the illicit varieties. Keep your eyes peeled as you explore and you'll find photo-op worthy spots as unique as you are.

Mt. Bonnell – Mayfield Park – Laguna Gloria: This trifecta of outdoor fun is an unbeatable way to spend a sunny morning. Start with an early climb of the 100 stairs to the top of Mt. Bonnell. At 775 feet, the highest point in Austin offers a spectacular panoramic view of the city. Just a few minutes' drive down the mountain you'll find the entrance to Mayfield Park, a peaceful garden and nature preserve inhabited by dozens of peacocks. Right next door sits Laguna Gloria, the former estate of philanthropist Clara Driscoll. Now part of The Contemporary Austin, the lush grounds are open for the public to enjoy.

Cathedral of Junk: Looking to take a walk on Austin's weird side? Don't miss local yardist Vince Hannemann's backyard ode to discarded treasures. Imagine a multi-story outdoor I Spy museum of times gone past. It's like that, only weirder. You must call to arrange a visit and be sure to bring along a \$10 donation for your group.

The Boardwalk at Lady Bird Lake: This 1.3-mile ADA-friendly boardwalk skirts the edge of Lady Bird Lake, connecting to the 10-mile Ann and Roy Butler Hike-and-Bike Trail. The scenic path offers amazing views of the city, the lake, and the wildlife. Sunsets here are hard to beat.

Texas Capitol + Downtown walking tour: You don't have to be interested in history or politics to appreciate a visit to the Capitol. Whether you take a free guided tour of the building or wander on your own, you'd be remiss not to spend some time in the rotunda. The ceiling is breathtaking and the "whispering gallery" acoustics are a blast to play around with. The building, clad in distinctive pink granite, sits on 22 acres of grassy lawn with several hills ripe for rolling kiddos. The Capitol Visitor Center is worth your time, too. Several downtown guided walking tours begin at the Capitol. If you prefer to go the self guided route, the Historic Austin Tours app (for iPhone or iPad) can point the way.

Zilker Park: This 350-acre wonderland will keep your brood busy for days. Zilker Botanical Garden displays an impressive array of plants, ponds, waterfalls, and an assortment of pioneer buildings. Kids can dig for dinosaur bones and explore hands-on nature exhibits at the Austin Nature & Science Center. Cool off with a dip in Barton Springs Pool's 70-degree spring-fed water before hopping on the Zilker Zephyr for a 20-minute ride through the park. Relish a rest in the shade while the little ones go wild on the playground before

Zilker Hillside Theater. Need help navigating? You can find a handy map of Zilker Park here.

Thinkery: Designed for families to play and learn together, the Thinkery succeeds in being fun for kids and grownups alike. The STEM-based exhibits encourage creative problem solving through hands-on projects and tons of activities. It's likely that the kids will end up wet, so a spare set of clothes may come in handy. Or just let them dry off at one of Austin's coolest playgrounds, right across the street.

Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center: Don't let the name fool you—this special place is so much more than wildflowers. Gardens, trails, wildlife, and award-winning architecture all in a gorgeous setting.

Live music: It's no secret that Austin is the live music capital of the world. Just because you've got kids in tow doesn't mean you have to miss out on that experience. These venues offer shows the whole family can enjoy together. Check the calendars for kids' and all-ages shows: Central Market North, Central Market Westgate, Threadgill's, Guero's Taco Bar, Hill's Cafe, Cherrywood Coffeehouse, Stubb's, Nutty Brown Cafe, Broken Spoke, The Belmont, and Radio Coffee & Beer.

The Complete Guide to Austin Greenbelt Access Points and Trails

There are multiple greenbelts in Austin, but the Barton Creek Greenbelt is so beloved that locals commonly refer to it as "the Greenbelt," as if it were the only one. Located in south-central Austin, the Barton Creek Greenbelt contains 12.68 miles of gorgeous trails, with the main trail spanning about 7 miles. This particular greenbelt is considered one of the top hiking trails in Texas. But this area is not only for hiking. One of the city's most prized attractions, the Barton Creek Greenbelt is filled with mountain biking trails and beautiful limestone bluffs for rock climbing. And when there's enough water in the creek, there are several swimming holes locals like to enjoy. It's hard to believe something so beautiful is located minutes from downtown.

Unfortunately for newcomers, accessing the Barton Creek Greenbelt can be a little confusing. To help, here is a complete guide to all the public access points for Austin's natural gem.

Trail Head 2201 Barton Springs Road

Considered the trailhead of the Barton Creek Greenbelt, this access point is great for beginners and those looking for a low-impact, relaxing hike. There's ample parking in and around Zilker Park, though it does get busy on weekends and you do have to pay for parking. The beginning of the trail is pretty flat and not too demanding. From here, if you head about 1.2 miles south, you'll come to the next access point.

Spyglass Access 1601 Spyglass Dr.

Spyglass has been my very favorite access point for several years, mainly because this is where I discovered Taco Deli. I know this article isn't about tacos, but if you are using this access point you must stop and try this local favorite. Grab a couple of breakfast tacos and be on your way to explore.


There is usually easy street parking at this access point. If you head north on the trail-or left for those directionally challenged-you'll arrive at Campbell's Hole, a popular swimming spot...when there's water.

If you head south—or to the right—you'll catch the first of many climbing walls on the Barton Creek Greenbelt, Enclave, and great bouldering areas. If climbing is your thing, continue south and you'll hit Seismic Wall. I should probably mention that climbers give their routes funny names.

Barton Hills Access

2010 Homedale Dr.

If you're wanting to reach Campbell's Hole from the east side of the creek, you can find an access point at Barton Hills Elementary School. The street parking is located in a residential neighborhood, so please be considerate to those who live in the area. Again, head north to arrive at Campbell's Hole.



There are additional hiking trails on the east side of the creek (this is where the 12.68 miles come into play). So even if there's no water, there's still plenty to explore in this area.

From here, travel about 1.2 miles to the next access point.

Gus Fruh Access

2642 Barton Hills Dr.

Gus Fruh access point is also located within a residential neighborhood, so be courteous and don't block any driveways. There's another popular swimming hole here...when there's water. It can get quite deep, unlike Campbell's Hole. You'll also find several great limestone climbing walls, such as Urban Assault, as you head south from this access point.

Loop 360 Access

3755-B Capital of Texas Hwy (Loop 360)

When I first moved to Austin, I heard people talking about "the Greenbelt." With piqued interest, I did a trusty Google search. Loop 360 is the only access point Google references. Even so, I'll be honest: I had a strangely hard time finding this entrance because—as you pull up—it looks like you're entering an office complex.

Remember, just turn at that light! There's a designated parking lot with overflow parking in the office park on weekends. You'll see the distinct Austin Parks and Recreation sign as you pull up—which all public access points have.

This access point is where you start to notice more mountain bikers, since from here the terrain is a lot more "fun." This is also the main access point for the popular climbing wall, Seismic. I've climbed Seismic several times, including once in the dark. It's pretty magical.

The biggest downfall to this section of the greenbelt is the noise pollution from the highway. So if you're heading to the Barton Creek Greenbelt for meditative time, you may want to start at a different access point.

On your way to the next access point at Mopac, about 1.3 miles away, you'll run into a fork in the trail where the Violet Crown Trail and the Barton Creek Greenbelt trails divide. Continue straight to remain on the Barton Creek Greenbelt trail.

Trails End

1710 Camp Craft Road

Considered the trails end, this access is my new favorite. Here you will find the famous Hill of Life and Sculpture Falls. Sculpture Falls, you guessed it, is another swimming hole. And the Hill of Life is...well...a challenge! It's about a half-mile downhill hike, or uphill depending on the direction you're going. It's great on a mountain bike and perfect for trail runners who want an extra challenge. I really like that there are additional trails to explore and it's typically less crowded in this area. And I secretly like the Hill of Life.

Gaines/Twin Falls Access


3918 S. Mopac Expy

This entrance, in my opinion, is the trickiest. From Capital of Texas Highway, turn as if you're heading south on Mopac. But instead of taking the on-ramp, remain on the frontage road. Just past the ramp, you'll find the next Barton Creek Greenbelt access point. Look for parked cars on the right side of the road, and you'll find the entrance near the U-turn.

There is no parking lot, which is why it's so tricky. So be extra careful of traffic when walking along the road as you arrive.

Why access the greenbelt from here if it's so tricky? Because from here you can quickly reach another swimming hole, Twin Falls. And even when there isn't water, this arearanks high in my book because of the stunning and beautiful trees.

This access point is great for hikers, trail runners and mountain bikers, since the terrain is a little more diverse. Plus, it becomes less crowded from here to the last access point, which is about 2.8 miles west.



Final Tips

Now that you know WHERE you're going, here are a few important things to remember. First and foremost, since you are in a dog city, it's important to note that dogs are welcome on the trail. However, they must be keep them on a leash at all times.

There are no restrooms, water fountains or trashcans on the trail itself, so plan ahead.


Bring water with you and dispose of trash (including dog excrement) at the access points.





Austin's Best Swim Spots



#6 Stacy Pool

Tucked into the charming Travis Heights neighborhood in South Austin, this pool has been keeping Austinites of all ages cool and entertained since the mid-1930s! The pool is free and open year-round. Big Stacy is heated in the winter by water from an Artesian well located 2000 feet below the surface. Much like Austin, this swim spot is fun, friendly, and diverse, so whether you are looking to swim laps or sunbathe you're sure to have a good time. (512)

#7 Krause Springs in Spicewood

Krause Springs is a well-known camping & swimming site located in the beautiful Hill Country of Texas. The 115 acre property is listed on the National Registry of Historical Sites and has been privately owned by the Krause Family for over 50 years. Krause Springs has many natural sites to explore. There are 32 springs on the property, and several feed the manmade pool and the natural pool which flow into Lake Travis. It's a refreshing treat to swim in the Springs during the hot summers of Texas! #8 Hippie Hollow

Situated on 109 peaceful acres, Hippie Hollow is a clothing optional park securely nestled in the natural beauty of the Hill County of Lake Travis. Located only 20 minutes off Interstate 35, but a world away from the bustle of nearby Austin, a haven for those who wish to escape the rigors of modern life in a safe and comfortable nudist atmosphere. The Park features a steep, rocky shoreline and provides some spectacular views of Lake Travis. This heavily-used park, the only clothing optional public park in Texas, is popular for sunbathing and swimming. Entry to the park is restricted to those people 18 years and older. (512) 854-7275.

#9 Blue Hole in Georgetown

Blue Hole Park is a scenic lagoon bordered by limestone bluffs along the South Fork of the San Gabriel River. The minimal crowds and plentiful space make it a nice respite from the summer heat and the fact hat it's located just minutes away from the city center makes it even more remarkable. This city park can be a breathtaking escape. Blue Hole is located five blocks north of the downtown Square along N. Austin Avenue and is open from dawn until dusk.. The park features picnic areas, restrooms, and wading areas. The entrance to Blue Hole Park is at W. Second Street and Rock Street. (512) 930-3595.

#10 Blue Hole in Wimberley

Take a plunge into the clear, cold spring fed waters of Wimberley's famous Blue Hole! When real estate developers wanted to set up shop on the Blue Hole, the folks in Wimberley put their collective foot down and initiated the necessary fundraising and city-bill-writing to make Blue Hole a city park. Blue Hole is the locals' favorite spot to cool off. The park includes approximately 3.5 miles of trails, picnic areas, a community pavilion, playscape, basketball court, sand volleyball court, amphitheater, and the Blue Hole Swimming Area. Blue Hole is one of the best loved natural swimming holes in Texas. The entire park is open to visitors within the regular operating hours, however swimming is only allowed Memorial Day through Labor Day.

#1 Barton Springs

Within Zilker Park's 358 acres lies one of the crown jewels of Austin - Barton Springs Pool. The pool itself measures three acres in size, and is fed from underground springs with an average temperature of 68-70 degrees, ideal for year-round swimming. Barton Springs attracts a diverse crowd of people and has seen record setting numbers of visitors nearing 800,000 in recent years. The pool is closed to the public from 9a-7p every Thursday to allow for the vigorous and methodical cleaning methods required to help maintain the pool area for wildlife and guests alike. Depths of the pool range from 0' to 18' with surrounding grassy areas for patrons to lounge upon. Adjacent to the pool bathhouse is Splash!, an educational exhibit were patrons can learn about the history and biology of Barton Springs and the Edwards Aquifer which feeds it. (512) 867-3080.

#2 Hamilton Pool

The preserve's pool and grotto were formed when the dome of an underground river collapsed due to massive erosion thousands of years ago. There is a 45 foot waterfall creating a great swimming hole. Swimming is allowed only when the water quality meets safe standards. Water quality is monitored regularly. Updated information is posted at the entrance booth and provided on the park's telephone recorder message (512) 264-2740. The parking lot is sized for 75 cars, and when all spaces are taken, cars are held up at the gate until a space opens. Reservations are required to enter Hamilton Pool from May 1, 2017 through September 30, 2017. Entrance Fees paid when you arrive at the preserve are \$15 per vehicle, or \$5 per vehicle if vehicle has a senior citizen (62 years) or a disabled vet.

#3 Deep Eddy Pool

Deep Eddy Pool is a historic, man-made swimming pool in Austin. Deep Eddy is the oldest swimming pool in Texas and has a bathhouse built during the Depression-era, by the Works Progress Administration. The pool began as a swimming hole in the Colorado River, became a resort in the 1920s, and is today a popular swimming pool operated by the City of Austin.

#4 San Marcos River

Tube it, snorkel it, or swim it. This spot is worth the 30-minute drive from Austin. Fed by San Marcos Springs, there are several spots that are fun to explore along this river. The San Marcos River bubbles to life from hundreds of springs right in the City's center. Always a refreshing 72 degrees, the river is enjoyed year 'round. Grab a tube and go for a float, rent a kayak or stand-up paddle, snorkel or just bring a picnic and soak up some sun. (512) 393-5930.

#5 Sculpture Falls on Barton Creek

Sculpture Falls is a dog-friendly, secluded swimming hole with clear and cool waters located within city of Austin. Sculpture Falls is a hidden gem that is part of the 7.9 mile long Barton Creek Greenbelt. It's considered an urban oasis and is part of the Edwards Aquifer making the water temperatures in the summer about 70 degrees. It is a perfect way to cool off in the Texas heat! (512) 974-6700.

Sports and Activities

Clyde Littlefield Texas Relays. One of the top track and field events in the U.S., the Texas Relays are held in early April at Mike A. Myers Stadium at the University of Texas. The Relays, founded in 1925, attract about 5,000 of the best athletes in Texas (and elsewhere) on the high-school, collegiate, and professional levels. Republic of Texas Biker Rally. Every June, tens of thousands of bikers invade Austin for three days of partying, camping, talking shop, and browsing vendors' wares. Based at the Travis County Expo Center just east of the city, the event includes a huge Friday-evening motorcycle parade from the Expo Center to Congress Avenue with much of Austin looking on, and much partying ensuing (both during and afterward) among bikers and spectators alike on 6th Street. There are also free concerts by local musicians Thursday through Saturday at the Expo Center rally grounds. On its more than 300 acres, the Expo Center provides special lots for RV and tent camping. Other bikers also stay in off-site RV lots and, of course, in hotels. On-site facilities include hot and cold showers, food service, a first-aid station, and a FedEx/UPS drop site. 512/252–9768. www.rotrally.com.

Star of Texas Fair & Rodeo. Did you come to Texas to see some real cowboy stuff? Austin puts on its hat and boots at this very popular perennial affair. The event, held at the Travis County Expo Center, typically runs from the last day of February through the first half of March. It includes an indoor rodeo, a livestock and horse show, various Texas-style cookoffs, and a carnival. Entertainment ranges from name acts like Willie Nelson, George Jones, and Styx to more than 40 local bands. Bicycling

As you might expect, Lance Armstrong's home base is a great bicycling town. The scenic back roads offer gently rolling hills and tempting diversions—from tucked-away waterfalls to country antiques emporia to barbecue joints. Loop 360 provides a grueling workout, while the hike-and-bike trail around Lady Bird Lake is more leisurely. And the Lance Armstrong Bikeway, which at this writing was expected to open in spring 2008, runs east-to-west on a dedicated route through downtown. The path uses a combination of off-street concrete trails, on-street striped bike lanes, and on-street signed bike routes.

Natural Areas & Parks

Austin has more than 200 parks within the city limits. Amenities in the parks range from playgrounds, swimming pools, and skate parks (the city's first was established at Maybel Davis District Park in south Austin) to artwork and historic sites, such as Umlauf Sculpture Garden at Zilker Park and Treaty Oak Square in northwest Austin.

Spelunking

Inner Space Cavern. This Mesozoic-era karst cavern 24 miles north of Austin was discovered in 1963 and opened to the public three years later. Visitors access the entrance via cable car and can choose from two trails, one that is.75 miles and another that's 1.2 miles. Tours vary in length (and price) from just a little over an hour to nearly four hours. The temperature is a year-round 72°. Kids get discounted admission; the three- to four-hour tour is for ages 13 and older only. On Saturdays, reservations are required and groups can be no larger than four. Swimming

When those summer days get hotter than a potter's furnace, dip into Zilker Park's 300-yard-long, spring-fed swimming pool, a favorite with locals. The clear springs produce from 12 million to 90 million gallons in any 24-hour period, the water always a rather cool 66° to 70°. The oldest swimming pool in Texas (1916), this former natural swimming hole near the Colorado River was the centerpiece of an early-20th-century resort and was purchased and restored by the Works Progress Administration in the mid-'30s. In recent years, the Friends of Deep Eddy, a volunteer community group, led a successful effort to fully restore the long-closed 1936 bathhouse, which reopened in June 2007.

Downtown

Austin Nature and Science Center. Adjacent to the Zilker Botanical Gardens, this complex has an 80-acre preserve trail, interactive exhibits in the Discovery Lab that teach about the ecology of the Austin area, and animal exhibits focusing on subjects such as bees and birds of prey. 301 Nature Center Dr., Austin, TX. 512/327–8180. www.ci.austin.tx.us/ansc. West Austin/Zilker Park

Zilker Park. The former site of temporary Franciscan missions in 1730 and a former American Indian gathering place is now Austin's everyday backyard park. The 351-acre site along the shores of Lady Bird Lake includes Barton Springs Pool, numerous gardens, a meditation trail, and a Swedish log cabin dating from the 1840s. In March, the park hosts a kite festival (2008 saw the 80th edition). During spring months, concerts are held in the park's Beverly S. Sheffield Zilker Hillside Theater, a natural outdoor amphitheater beneath a grove of century-old pecan trees; in July and August, musicals and plays take over. Umlauf Sculpture Garden & Museum, at the park's southern end, displays 130 or more works by sculptor and former UT art professor Charles Umlauf. Art workshops for both kids and adults are occasionally offered. 2201 Barton Springs Rd., Austin, TX. 512/974-6700 (Parks Dept.); 512/477–5335 (theater); 512/445–5582 (museum). www.ci.austin.tx.us/zilker. West Lake

Barton Creek Greenbelt. This park follows the contour of Barton Creek and the canyon it created west along a 7.9 mile-long area from Zilker Park to west of Loop 360. It has a trail for hiking and biking, plus swimming holes when the creek is full (very rain-dependent, it's usually in spring and fall). Access points: Zilker Park, Loop 360, Twin Falls, and Scottish Woods Trail Falls (near the intersection of MoPac and Loop 360), and Scottish Woods Trail (at the trail's northern border off Loop 360), Austin, TX. 512/499–6700 or 512/472–1267. www.austin-parks.org/our-parks.html?parkid=206. Free. 5am–10pm.

Wild Basin Wilderness Preserve. Stunning contrasting views of the Hill Country and the Austin skyline make it worth the trip to this area near the 360 Bridge. You can wander along 227 acres of walking trails (there are 10 different ones); guided tours are offered on weekends. The cool folks at Wild Basin offer numerous outdoor-oriented classes, nighttime stargazing sessions, even concerts by well-known touring musicians. 805 N. South Austin

Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center. This 43-acre complex, founded in 1982 by Lady Bird Johnson and actress Helen Hayes, has extensive plantings of native Texas wildflowers that bloom year-round (although spring is an especially attractive time). The grounds include a visitor center, nature trail, observation tower, elaborate stone terraces, and flower-filled meadows. 4801 LaCrosse Ave., Austin, TX. 512/292–4100. www.wildflower.org. \$7. Adrenaline junkies

We've rounded up the most extreme things to do in Austin, activities guaranteed to satisfy for your need for speed and excitement.

Skydiving

Nothing says pure exhilaration like jumping out of a plane. Skydiving Austin Texas and Skydiving Over Austin offer tandem packages for your first jump. You can also hit up the Texas Skydiving Center for in-depth, one-day skydiving classes.

Hang gliding

Explore the skies — and learn how to hang glide — at Fly Texas. You'll start with practice runs off a hill, then upgrade to more advanced flights. There's also a tandem package available.

Ziplining

Zoom along a zipline through the trees of Spicewood at Cypress Valley Canopy Tours. The treetop tour offers multiple ziplines and skybridges and ends with a rappel down from the platform.

Flyboarding

Fly Lake Austin lets you take off and "fly" around Lake Austin in a water-powered jet pack. There are two different contraptions to try: a Flyboard, which is strapped to your feet Marty McFly-style, and the Jetovator, a scooter-like apparatus.



Wakeboarding

Texas Ski Ranch in New Braunfels is a great place to wakeboard behind a boat or on the cable course. Bonus: Texas Ski Ranch also has a seasonal snow park where you can snowboard on an outdoor turf course.

Rock climbing

Austin is surrounded by stunning places to rock climb. Rock-About offers a "101: Basic Climbing Skills" course, which includes safety instructions and climbs at places like Enchanted Rock, the Barton Creek Greenbelt and Reimer's Ranch. You can also try Austin Rock Gym for an indoor climb.

Go-kart racing

These tracks allow you to race on an extreme outdoor course with professional instruction so you can drive like a champ. NASCAR fans, check out Central Texas Speedway; Formula One lovers should give Driveway Austin a spin.

Paintballing

Get tactical with your close friends (or enemies) at Austin Paintball and Xtreme Paintball. No equipment? No problem. These pros will hook you up with a gun, mask and round of paintballs.

Spectator Sports

Next to UT football, Austin's most popular spectator sport may be the Round Rock Express baseball team, a AAA affiliate of the Houston Astros. The Express (owned by a group led by Hall of Fame pitcher Nolan Ryan) began in 2000 as a AA team, and moved up to AAA in 2005. It plays 72 home games from April through September at the Dell Diamond, an extremely pleasant place to pass a few hours, no matter who's winning. The openair stadium seats about 8,600 with room for more in an outfield grass berm area. No ticket costs more than \$12 (as of 2008), and it's hard to find a bad seat in this very fan-friendly (and family-friendly) ballpark.

Formerly the Columbus (Georgia) Riverdragons, the Toros, a team in the NBA's Development League, or "D-League," was rebranded when it moved to Austin in 2005. Affiliated with (and owned by) the San Antonio Spurs, the Toros play home games November through April at the Austin Convention Center.

This arena football expansion team began play in 2004, and moved down from the AFL to af2 (the Arena Football League's developmental league) beginning in the 2008 season. The team plays from April to July. Home games are at UT's Frank Erwin Center.

Golf

This resort is associated with four private courses, including two of the top-ranked courses in Texas, Fazio Foothills and Fazio Canyons. Unfortunately, you either have to be a member or a hotel guest to play here. Greens fees vary widely by season, day of the week, and time of day, but for resort guests the Fazio Canyons and Fazio Foothills courses run from \$80 (twilight) to \$250 per person, including a forecaddie (but not gratuity). The Crenshaw Cliffside course runs from \$60 to \$180 (forecaddie not required) and the Palmer Lakeside course from \$45 to \$155 (forecaddie not required). Various golf packages are also available throughout the year; check website for details.

The likes of Ben Crenshaw, Tom Kite, and Ben Hogan are among those who have played at this affordable 6,001-yard, par-71 public course in West Austin. It was originally built by the Lions Club in 1928 and taken over by the city six years later. It is open daily, dawn to dusk. Greens fees run \$7–\$20. Cart fees are \$22.

South Austin

The Veloway. This 3.1-mile paved asphalt loop winding through Slaughter Creek Metropolitan Park is reserved exclusively for bicyclists and rollerbladers. Riders always travel in a one-way clockwise direction. It's off the beaten path in far southwest Austin, not far from the Lady Bird Johnson Wildflower Center. No facilities except for a water fountain that sometimes doesn't work. 4103 Slaughter Lane, Austin, TX. 512/974–6700. www.veloway.com.

Boating

From March through October, this downtown-based company offers nightly bat-watching cruises from an electric paddlewheel boat, along with sightseeing, dinner, and lunch cruises on Lady Bird Lake. Cruise prices vary, but start at \$8 for adults. Charters are available. The company also rents canoes, pedal boats, and kayaks beginning at \$10 an hour, and Duffy electric launches (seating up to 10) beginning at \$45 an hour.

This double-decker paddlewheel riverboat sails every evening for hour-long bat-watching cruises March through October, and every weekend for 1½-hour sightseeing cruises. Tours are \$8 or \$9.

West Austin

On Lake Travis, Daybreak rents pontoons, ski boats, and waverunners, plus a party boat. Hourly prices begin at \$55 for pontoons, \$75 for ski boats, and \$135 for a party boat (including captain). Ask about discounts for longer rentals.

Lakeway Marina. Adjacent to the Lakeway Resort and Spa, this marina on Lake Travis rents ski boats, pontoon boats, and waverunners. Hourly rates begin at \$75 for pontoon boats and waverunners and \$80 for ski boats; ask about discounts for longer rentals. Also available are fishing guides, beginning at \$225 for two people for four hours. The marina is open daily. 103A Lakeway Dr., Austin, TX, 78734. 512/261–7511. www.lwmarina.biz.



Northeast Austin

Named for a legendary local golf instructor, Harvey Penick opened in 2005 in northeast Austin as a "First Tee" course for the specific purpose of teaching golf to young people (though golfers of all ages and abilities can play). The 112-acre, 9-hole, par-30, PGA Tour—designed course is next door to the East Communities YMCA. Lessons are offered. There's also a driving range and short course. Greens fees are \$12 for 9 holes, \$18 for 18 holes. Youth pay less. Cart fees are \$8.75 for 9 holes, and \$13.50 for 18 holes.

North Austin

Mount Bonnell. Rising to a height of 785 feet, Mount Bonnell offers the best views of Austin. Stop by during the day for a glimpse of the sweeping panorama of rolling hills, the Colorado River and the 360 Bridge, and the downtown skyline in the distance. It's an easy climb up from a parking area near the road (more of a diversion than a serious hike); you'll find students, lovers, families, picnickers and just plain old tourists here. Highland Lakes in Central Texas

Lake Buchanan, Inks Lake, Lake LBJ, Lake Marble Falls, Lake Travis and Lake Austin.

Lake Buchanan - Is the second largest of the Highland Lakes in Central Texas with a length of 30 miles and a width at the widest point of just under 5 miles. Lake Buchanan has a shoreline of 124 miles. When it was built, Buchanan Dam was considered to be the longest multiple-arch dam in the U.S. with a length of just over two miles. The lake is very popular with boaters, fishermen, campers and swimmers. The lake is so large that you will never feel crowded. The annual Lake Buchanan Regatta and Dam Jam is held at Cedar Lodge each April. Dozens of boats participate in the regatta and live music is performed by artists coming to Lake Buchanan from over 1,000 miles to participate in the event. Lake Buchanan is located 60 miles northwest of Austin and 95 miles north of San Antonio. It is about 200 miles south of Dallas and Fort Worth and 200 miles west of Houston.

Inks Lake - Located 55 miles northwest of Austin, Texas on Highway 29, Inks Lake is the next lake down the Colorado River from Lake Buchanan. It starts just a short distance from the base of Buchanan Dam. With a length of 4.2 miles and a width of 3,000 feet, Inks Lake is the shortest of the first four lakes but is also one of the prettiest. The boating and water skiing are fantastic on Inks Lake. The State Park is a 1,200 acre panorama of cedar and oak woodlands and offers swimming, boating, fishing,



hiking, and BBQing. Inks Lake is well-known for its bass, crappie and catfish. Highland Lakes Public Golf Club is a 9 Hole, Public Course, located on Inks Lake on Park Road 4 a few minutes south of Hwy 29. This course is only about a 15 minute drive from Burnet and 20 minutes from Marble Falls, Texas. The lake is also well known for it's 7.5 miles of hiking trails.

Lake LBJ - Lake LBJ, named after President Lyndon B. Johnson, starts at Kingsland and goes all of the way to Horseshoe Bay, 45 miles northwest of Austin. Lake LBJ is one of the largest normally at constant level lake in the United States, and is just over 21 miles long with a maximum width of 10,800 feet. Lake LBJ is perfect for sailing, boating, waterskiing, jetskiing, and all water related activities. Tourists are attracted from all over Texas and the U.S. to take advantage of this big beautiful lake.

Lake Marble Falls - Lake Marble Falls is the 4th lake in the

Highland Lakes string of lakes on the Colorado River in the Central Texas Hill Country. Lake Marble Falls is a normally constant level lake and is popular for boating, and waterskiing. It is 5.75 miles long and 1,080 feet wide in the widest area. The annual Cigarette Boat Race is hosted on Lake Marble Falls in the town of Marble Falls. Lake Marble Falls is located at the booming town of Marble Falls about 45 miles northwest of Austin. It can be reached from Austin by driving out Highway 71 and then north on Highway 281, or by going west on Highway 1431 out of Cedar Park on the north edge of Austin.

Lake Travis - Lake Travis has the largest storage capacity of the seven reservoirs known as the Highland Lakes, and stretches 65 miles (105 km) upriver from western Travis County in a highly serpentine course into southern Burnet County to Max Starcke Dam, southwest of the town of Marble Falls. The Pedernales River, a major tributary of the Colorado River, flows into the lake from the southwest in western Travis County. The lake is used for flood control, water supply, electrical power generation and recreation. Because of its volume, the lake serves as the primary flood control reservoir of the Highland Lake chain. The level of the lake can therefore vary dramatically, depending on the amount of rainfall in the Colorado River basin upstream. Despite this, the lake furnishes one of the most desired locations in the region for outdoor recreation, including fishing, boating, swimming, scuba diving, picnicking, camping, and zip lining. Lake Travis is generally considered one of the clearest lakes in Texas. It is a vital water supply for the nearby city of Austin, Texas and the surrounding metropolitan area.

Lake Austin - Lake Austin is the sixth lake down in the chain of Highland Lakes on the Colorado River in Central Texas. The lake starts at the Mansfield Dam and ends at the Tom Miller Dam in the city of Austin. Lake Austin has high cliffs in places along the shore of the lake which provide shelter from the wind for the best in boating activities. The cliffs are dotted with expensive homes overlooking the lake.

Lady Bird Lake - A seventh lake, which is not considered a part of the Highland Lakes chain, is Lady Bird Lake in Austin. Lady Bird Lake (formerly known as Town Lake) is in the city of Austin, Texas. Lady Bird Lake runs between Riverside Drive and 1st Street in the downtown area of Austin. Interstate I-35 goes over Lady Bird Lake as you are driving through Austin. Lady Bird Lake is 6 miles long and from 400 feet to 2,500 feet wide at it widest point and has an average depth of 14 feet. Lady Bird Lake is just

More than one company traverses Lake Travis with skilled and experienced parasailing attendants that will send you flying.

Fishing

If angling is your passion, Lake Travis is your paradise. Just minutes away from your Hill Country retreat in our beautiful community is a lake full of largemouth bass, catfish and Guadalupe bass. You can explore the waters yourself or use a local fishing guide to learn the ropes on the Lake Travis waters.

Water Parks

The water parks at Lake Travis are perhaps one of the best kept secrets in the Austin area. Granite Beach Water Park is open every weekend of the summer inside a protected cove. Both adults and children can play on the park's water trampoline, slides and other attractions, and lifeguards are always on duty for safety. Another water park, Shore Club Volente Beach, is a more traditional water park with slides, lagoons and play areas.

Boating, Kayaking and Jet Skiing

Because Lake Travis is one of the largest in Texas, it is no wonder it is such a popular destination for boating, kayaking and jet skiing. Rent your favorite watercraft from a local vendor, or bring your own. For a real treat while you're out on the water, be sure to take a ride under the famous Pennybacker Bridge before heading back.

Zip Lining

For the adventurous at heart, zip lining is the ultimate Lake Travis experience. At Lake Travis Zip Line Adventures, you can soar across five zip lines – one of which is more than 2,000 feet long! You will launch off of a cliff

that is 20 stories high, and an experienced tour guide will be there with you every step of the way.

Swimming



1. Texas State Capitol

The TX State Capitol is the oldest surviving state office structure and a great place to learn about Texas history and the Texas Legislature. Free Tours: $Mon - Fri: 8:30 \ am - 4:30 \ pm/Sat: 9:30 \ am - 3:30 \ pm/Sun: Noon - 3:30 \ pm$.

2. Baylor Street Art Wall

This is one of those Austin stops that uniquely captures the essence of Austin. Once slated to be a condo project that ended up not materializing, the concert foundation has become a canvas for local graffiti artists. It is constantly changing, just like the city. While there be sure to climb to the top to get a great view of the city. Location: 11th & Baylor Street.

3 Hill Country Libations Tour

The Hill Country begins just west of Austin and is known for it's beautiful rolling landscapes, and more recently, for its world-class breweries and distilleries. Our friends at Austin Tour Company have created a tour by bus that hits several of our favorite venues, and includes complimentary tastings (including pizza!) in the tour's ticket price. Tours depart from Downtown Austin every Saturday at Noon.

4. The Escape Game Austin

We've tried several of the escape/puzzle games that have popped up in Austin over the last few years, but The Escape Game Austin has been our favorite by a landslide. They have multiple experiences to choose from, (and we've loved them all) but "Gold Rush" is our number one recommendation, with "Prison Break" (pictured below) as a close second!

5. Congress Avenue BATS

The Congress Bridge plays home to the largest urban bat colony in North America. About 1.5 million Mexican free tail bats call the Congress Bridge home from Spring to early Fall as they migrate north. Each night around dusk the bats start their evening flight. It normally starts with a single bat leaving the bridge and quickly turns into a steady flow of countless bats in search of food. It's one of those things that is truly unexplainable until you see it first hand.

6. Stand Up Paddleboard, Kayak, or Canoe on Lady Bird Lake

One of the best ways to check out Downtown Austin is from the water. Lady Bird Lake (or Town Lake as some locals call it) runs from the Westside of the city, all the way past Highway 35 into East Austin. The water is calm enough for a peaceful day trip or a sunset paddle. Be sure to bring your beverage of choice and a waterproof camera or ziplock bag for your phone; you're going to want to take pictures! The Rowing Dock is located on the Southern shore of the lake just West of MoPac (Loop 1), and they offer a wide selection of kayaks, canoes, and Stand Up Paddleboards for rental at competitive prices.

7. Zilker Park

Zilker Park is a 351 acre, dog-friendly park situated in the heart of Austin. It serves as a hub for many special events such as ACL, SWSW, The Zilker Kite Festival and many more. The park offers many different types of fun outdoor activities such as hiking, biking, jogging, kayaking, paddle boarding, and kayaking.

8. Haunted Limo Tours

Hop into a classic Cadillac hearse that has been converted into a limousine and tour several of Austin's most haunted locations! This intimate tour seats up to 6 people and highlights some of the oldest, coolest, and

spookiest buildings in Austin. Tours run nightly at 8pm most days of the week and tickets are only \$45 per person.

9. Rainey Street

The most well known party-street in Austin is still 6th Street, but in recent years Rainey Street has given it a run for its money. There are a plethora of older homes that have been turned into bars, and most of them have great outdoor patios. There are also several really great dining options in the neighborhood as well.

10. Hiking Trails

Central Texas is often referred to as the gateway to the Hill Country, and with those hills come beautiful trails, streams, and greenbelts that are absolutely perfect for outdoor adventures.

11. Swimming Holes

Barton Springs Pool

Barton Springs Pool is situated at the grounds of Zilker Park. It is a mustgo-to place in the summer to cool off, with a 68 degree temp all year round.

Hamilton Pool Preserve

The closest thing to an oasis you'll likely ever see. This swimming hole sits in a natural grotto carved out of limestone, and is complete with a small beach area and a 50-foot waterfall!

Krause Spring

I almost don't even want to share this with you, as it's one of my favorite places on earth. But hey, welcome to Austin- I suppose you have just as much a right to enjoy this gem as I do. This family-owned property in Spicewood Springs is what dreams are made of. Natural springs fill a concrete swimming pool on the upper part of the property and the runoff flows via waterfall into the lagoon-like swimming hole down below. You definitely don't feel like you're in Central Texas when you spend a day out here.

12. Brewery Tours

Looking for a departure from the 6th Street bars? Austin is regularly ranked as one of the top cities in the nation for craft brewing. Take a tasting tour of the local microbreweries such as Jester King, Hops & Grain, and Austin Beerworks. Drink yummy craft beer, meet awesome people.

13. Lake Travis Zipline Adventures

Thrill seekers; come one, come all! This thrilling adventure over Lake Travis will get your blood pressure pumping. Even with the lake levels low, the views while ziplining are absolutely incredible and it's a one-of-a-kind experience. Be prepared to reach speeds of 60 mph.
